

Ellie's journey of hope and new beginnings

Ellie was just 29 years old when her life took an unexpected turn. During a routine annual exam, her primary care physician discovered a lump in her breast. Ellie had noticed the lump before, but it wasn't until her doctor's demeanor changed that she realized the seriousness of the situation.

Breast cancer at such a young age is rare, but not unheard of. According to the CDC, 9% of all new breast cancer cases in the United States occur in women younger than 45. Ellie's case was one of those rare instances. Her doctor's vigilance and expertise led to an early diagnosis, which was crucial for her treatment and recovery.

When Ellie's lump was found, she was referred to a specialized breast center. There, expert radiologists and clinicians conducted thorough examinations and a biopsy, which confirmed the diagnosis. This meticulous approach is part of what makes Allina Health a leader in cancer care.

Ellie's story is a testament to the life-saving impact of early detection and expert medical care. Today, she is cancer-free and deeply grateful for the support she received. "I credit Allina Health and all my doctors. They saved my life," she says. "My care coordinator was always there, listening and taking care of absolutely everything. My team also paired me with a fertility clinic to protect my dreams of becoming a mom one day, and I'm happy to say I'm expecting my first child early next year!"

Generous donors fund new Transitional Rehabilitation Program gym

We are excited to announce that the Transitional Rehabilitation Program (TRP) at the Courage Kenny Rehabilitation Institute in Golden Valley has a brand-new gym to call home!

The new TRP area combines three smaller spots into one cohesive and efficient space. This upgrade includes the installation of ceiling lifts, which allowed us to add a Bioness Vector lift — a dynamic bodyweight ceiling harness. Previously the only lift was at the Abbott Northwestern Hospital Courage Kenny location.

This larger and more efficient area enables our Care Team Members to collaborate more effectively and meet the growing demands of our services for spinal cord injury, stroke, and brain injury patients. Interaction is also crucial for our patients, as they receive support, encouragement, and camaraderie from each other during their rehabilitation journey.

We welcomed our first patient Aug. 8. The celebration included a ribbon-cutting ceremony, graciously performed by TRP resident Timothy Johnson. This renovation was made possible through the generous donations to the Allina Health Foundation.









Expanding robot-assisted therapy programs at Courage Kenny

Thanks to an extremely generous estate gift from a loyal donor couple, plus additional support from the Cummins Foundation, an additional Lokomat® was purchased and installed in the Arthur Andersen Minneapolis Alumni Fitness & Wellness Center at Courage Kenny Rehabilitation Institute — Golden Valley. This highly innovative robotic walking system uses body-weight support to assist in basic walking.

The Lokomat® has been shown to improve recovery time and outcomes for people with spinal cord injuries, stroke and other neurological conditions.

This much needed equipment will be used by Transitional Rehabilitation Program (TRP) patients as well as outpatient and fitness clients.

Philanthropic support like this is an example of the tremendous impact our legacy partners provide. The transformative services at Courage Kenny Rehabilitation Institute continue to help people live, work and play more independently.

This Al technology provides an additional layer of safety, enhancing efficiency and outcomes, while reducing the total cost of care for patients. Thanks to this technology, Allina Health anticipates a 33% downstaging of lung cancer patients from Stage III/IV to Stage I/II. Wedum Residential Hospice staff fulfill a patient's last wish

Sometimes in life, joy can overshadow grief. That's the case for Becca Wichlen.

In January 2024, Becca's mom, Pam, was at the end of a six-year journey with cancer. To ensure her family didn't have to act as caregivers, Pam chose to move to the J.A. Wedum Residential Hospice for her final weeks. At the time, Becca was engaged to Tom, and they were expecting a baby in early March.


"As soon as my mom was transferred to hospice, I told Tom we needed to figure out how to get married," said Becca. She began thinking about how and where they could have a wedding so her mom could witness the ceremony.

Apparently, Pam was thinking about the same thing as she mentioned it to Judy Johnson, a hospice social worker.

"I got a call from Judy right after my mom moved in. I assumed she was calling about the rules and regulations of taking my mom off-site for a wedding," said Becca. "Instead, Judy said, 'If you're ok with it, we could host the wedding on-site."

At first Becca thought the ceremony would include just a few people in her mom's room, but Judy raised several ideas. "The staff were super amazing about the entire event," said Becca. "Judy asked me about the number of people who might attend and having a toast. She asked about things I hadn't thought about because all I thought about was making the wedding happen."

Just 10 days after Pam moved into hospice, Becca and Tom were married in the Reflection Room of J.A. Wedum Residential



An uncle of Becca's conducted the wedding ceremony, and another uncle played the guitar. The couple was toasted with apple juice so Pam could join in the moment. Wedum staff arranged for a volunteer pianist when guests were arriving.


"The wedding was her last good day. That brings me the most joy," said Becca. "Knowing that my mom was coherent and social and as able-bodied as she could be for the day of my wedding is my favorite thing about it."

Pam passed away two weeks after the wedding. Becca delivered her daughter, Kaylee, a few weeks later. Though Kaylee will never know her grandma, Becca's 9-year-old son, Brayden, promises to tell his little sister the family story. "He is adamant about making sure his sister knows about his grandma," said Becca.

"I don't have enough good things to say about Wedum," said Becca. "The staff were amazing. They made the wedding happen because my mom wanted it."
